

BRAND NEW HOMES FOR OUR ELDERLY RESIDENTS

Liberal Democrat councillors voted to replace all of the Council-run elderly people's homes with state of the art homes that will be among the best in the country. The purpose-built facilities will include three new care homes, as well as extra units that will enable people to live independent lives in flats with full care support. At full Council, we only won the day because three Labour councillors defied their Party whip by voting with us. Their Labour colleagues, like the Tories, wanted to privatise our homes.

Peter Metcalfe said: 'Now that these exciting plans are underway, I am even more convinced that the Tories were wrong. We need to ensure that our elderly are treated with respect and dignity. They also need security and now this will be provided. We are dedicating the resources to make sure this happens.'

We have now catalogued the various complaints and we have presented the file to the council officer responsible for cleansing. Thank you again, this has helped us in our efforts to bring cleaner streets to Widcombe. Because of the large number of responses, we have not yet replied individually to each of you, but we intend to do so.

SAFER TOWPATH

The retaining wall at the back of the arches which were used by the stone masons will soon be repaired. At present, it is supported by scaffold. This is a hazard to people walking along the towpath. Although the regeneration of the arches and the subways at the bottom of Wells Rd is taking longer to solve than we'd like, it is a first step.

GRAFFITI

The service designed to help businesses and home owners clear up graffiti has had few takers so far. If you need help, please contact B&NES **Action Line on 394041**. For a fee of £25 the Council will clean graffiti from your home and come back as many times as required within three months.

Car-related problems form the largest number of letters and telephone calls received by councillors.

In Widcombe we are helping to solve:

- * WELLS ROAD: The meeting between residents, Peter Metcalfe and council officers proved very useful. Parts of the Bus Lane are coming out. A full study of Wellsway/Wells Road from Odd Down to Churchill Bridge is underway for completion in the Spring. Some extra parking spaces will be marked on the uphill side of the road. This will improve residents' safety.

 *RESIDENTS PARKING: At last the officers have completed the review and analysed all the responses
- completed the review and analysed all the responses they received from residents. They received a large number of comments. Although we knew it would take some time, we insisted that the scheme must be right and reflect the concern of the local people. Your views have now been taken on board and changes to the residents parking zones will soon be advertised. It will be another opportunity for you to comment.
- *WIDCOMBE HIGH ST: Representatives of the Widcombe Association attended a meeting where consultants showed on a computer screen the effect of the traffic flow of the three schemes being considered to clear through traffic away from Claverton St. The Association will report back to Peter, Nicole and the council officers in mid January with their comments.
